#### **OUR WORST NIGHTMARE**

On July 29, 2023, we were excited for my nephew's wedding day. At the last minute I decided I was going to take our 5ish month-old pup with us as the venue was across the road from my daughter's house. This way I could let her out to do her business throughout the evening. I took her for a quick walk before leaving the house.

This was a potluck laid back affair, I loaded my yummy Mac'n'cheese filled slow cooker into the car, loaded Abba into her crate and off we went. We left Abba crated at my daughter's house, I returned about one hour later, let her out to do her business. Something seemed off but I couldn't place what it was, she was happy and did her business. I returned to the wedding, my gut was telling me I needed to check on her again, so again in about another hour and off I went.

What I walked into can only be described as pure shock, fear, and panic. Abba was lying in her crate unresponsive, her head lying in a mound of vomit and just the whites of her eyes could be seen. My daughter got on the phone to our vet who thankfully has 24-hour care for their clients, she was on hold for the answering service/triage for what seemed like hours. My husband and I jumped in the car and headed for our Vet's office before hearing anything back. I was terrified I was going to lose her before we got there. My Vet met us, I rushed her in. The Vet inserted a syringe into her belly to get a urine sample to test for substances. In seconds she was positive for THC and Opioids. He immediately administered Narcan, it was 3 doses later before she was stable. The Vet tech arrived and placed an IV catheter so they could administer meds to help bind the THC. It was touch and go! 3 Hours later we took her home, she was stable but the IV was left in just in case this changed, and she had to return.

The following day she had improved but was unable to walk and refused to eat. My Vet called first thing in the morning to follow-up, he was relieved she was now coming back albeit very slowly. It took two more days before she was her normal happy puppy again.

You might ask, where and when was she able to consume this substance. The answer is, on her walk before we left. The timing lined up with her symptoms, and at 10lbs, it doesn't take much to affect a small dog of that size. She had somehow scooped up the remnants of a marijuana joint laced with opioids that had been discarded by some irresponsible person.

I haven't written this to terrify others but instead to bring awareness of the risks now that Marijuana is legal in Canada. Like cigarette butts strewn on the ground, so is marijuana. I am now in the process of basket muzzle training both our dogs to not ever have this happen again. My Vet has seen a dramatic increase in dogs with THC poisoning, this was the first time he'd come across an Opioid combination.

Watch your dogs closely on walks, think about basket muzzle training as a preventive.

Clinical Footnote: Dr. Rea Marcelissen

Marijuana contains the cannibanoid compound known as THC, which can have medicinal effects for humans, but it is extremely toxic to dogs and cats. Small dogs only need to consume small amounts to become ill. When marijuana is laced with opioids or other drugs, there is risk of further severity of disease. THC can be either ingested or inhaled. THC affects every dog to a different degree and clinical signs can vary. It primarily affects the nervous system, so although some dogs might be sleepy, others may be hyperactive. In my clinical experience, most will be lethargic and have dilated

pupils, muscle tremors, drooling, vomiting, and leaking urine. Worst case scenario is seizures and death. What is most important is that if your dog shows any of these signs or you think your pet may have ingested marijuana to get them to your veterinarian as soon as possible. The Veterinarian may induce vomiting and give medications to decontaminate your dog, such as activated charcoal orally. They may be tested for THC and possibly other opiates as well, although cage- side testing is not available everywhere. They will likely have other testing done such as bloodwork to ensure there is no systemic damage. They will definitely be given supportive medications along with intravenous fluids. If they have inhaled secondhand smoke, they may be provided oxygen and medications to treat respiratory tract inflammation.

Basket muzzles are a great tool for preventing your Schipperke from ingesting unwanted materials. Basket muzzles are not the metal, "Cujo"-esque tools we think of from the past. They now are made of rubber and come in many colours and even with accessories! Fear Free TM has great resources on how to train your dog to use a basket muzzle. I have attached it below. Starting puppies young with basket muzzle training is ideal. Thankfully little Abba is doing much better and enjoying licking the peanut butter off the inside of her basket muzzle! Cathy can also rest a bit easier when out on walks, knowing Abba's chances of picking something toxic up off the ground are far less.



Emma earned her Grand Champion title at the SD&G Show handled by Sarah Clifford.


Emma, bred by Kim and Tim Delaney of Shillington Kennels, Fort Ellis, Nova Scotia, is co-owned with myself.

Earlier this year I was introduced to Sarah Clifford, an enthusiastic young woman who wished to try her hand at confirmation showing.



### **Agility Training for Pointers**

There are many reasons why agility training helps to support and enhance the performance of our pointer dogs in the field. It provides good physical exercise indoors (during foul/fowl weather) even though agility takes place mostly outdoors in spring, summer and fall.

Agility challenges your dog to be MORE agile, nimble, swift, quick, negotiate sharp turns, and problem solve. It also helps them to skillfully maneuver with more precision and speed.



#### What is Agility Training?

Agility consists of obstacles that are set up with equipment such as tunnels, tires, A-frames, broad jumps, high jumps, tetters, and dog walks. It provides a forum for pointers to practice jumping, running, stretching, crawling, making sharp moves and turns.

In trials, dogs are tested for correctness and speed. There are several levels of trials: beginner, intermediate and advanced in various forms of agility such as Standard, Jumpers, Snooker, Gambler. Some dog schools offer Agility training such as LUV-A-K9 in Kingston, and you can attend dog shows to witness agility trials. It is entertaining to say the least.

#### Why Agility Training?

A major benefit is to strengthen the team spirit and team work between you and your dog. It builds trust as it helps your dog to be more attentive, focus and follow your commands by reading your body language.

It also provides an opportunity for your dog to socialize with humans and other dogs, and to expose them to distractions and new possibilities. Finally, it is fun for both you and your dog!

# **Junior Handling National Championship**

The TIKO club has always supported Junior Handling at their shows & trials and through encouraging our own junior members. We are very happy to share coverage of this year's CKC National Junior Handling Championships that was held at the Club Canin Chomedey Inc., Terrebonne, Quebec on September 16, 2023

This annual event held all the excitement, nerves, bravado and ceremony one would expect of a National competition. In addition, it reflects the health of our sport moving toward the future. But in order for us all to appreciate the occasion we also have to understand what it takes to get to that point. Let's start with answering the question "What is the purpose of Junior Handling". To quote from the <u>CKC Junior</u> <u>Handling Rules & Regulations</u>...



The purpose of Junior Handling is to introduce and

encourage youth to participate in the sport of purebred dogs, and to provide them with meaningful competition where they can learn, practice, and hone their skills and knowledge of the various breeds. Above all, it is an opportunity to enjoy the camaraderie of competing with those of a similar age.

Junior handling in Canada has become an important aspect of the dog show world today. Many shows offered informal competitions during their shows, back in the day, but it became evident as witnessed in other countries that a more formal system would be beneficial.

The first ever Junior Handling National Championship was held at the CKC's 100th Anniversary Show at the Metro Toronto Convention Centre in the summer of 1988. In 1989, the Nationals moved to the Credit Valley Kennel and Obedience Dog Club where it was hosted for nine years until 1999, when the CKC Junior Kennel Club Council decided to make the Nationals a true nation-wide event.

You can visit the CKC website at <u>www.ckc.ca</u> to view the Junior Handling rules and regulations as well as the history of the National Competition as it makes for very interesting reading. For now please know that Canada has been divided into zones by the CKC and the top handlers from each zone represent their zone at the nationals. From all the handlers competing four handlers will be awarded placements. Wonderful prizes, including an educational bursary are provided. One of the most sought after awards for winning this prestigious event is the opportunity to represent Canada at the world renowned Crufts Juniorr Handling Competition in England.

The winner of the 2023 CKC National Junior Handling Championship is **Laurence Giguère**. The following is Laurence's description of the event and the road to the championship.

### Laurence Giguère - Winner of the 2023 Canadian National Junior Handling Competition



My name is Laurence Giguère and I am 18 years old. Everything started when I was 7 years old my parents were showing their Newfoundland and I was following them to Dog Shows.



One day I saw a junior handling competition and asked my mom if I could also participate. Since that day I totally fell in love with the sport and started working for many different professional handlers across the country. I also became a breeder/owner/handler of Clumber Spaniels with my mom, and we currently have four litters.

Now that I am 18 years old, I show my own dogs and continue to work for handlers as I believe that learning from others is a key element in this sport. I had the honor to win a best in show, multiple best puppies to Best Puppy in Show, Best Baby Puppy in Show, Best Altered in Show as well as to many Group placements.

The junior handling competition is based on the handler's skills. It is open to children aged from 4 to 18 years old. The first step is to participate in a junior handling competition held at regular conformation shows or specialities that offer the junior handling competition. And juniors must participate in at least 3 competitions to be eligible to participate at zone level finals. Zone finals are held in the fourteen different CKC zones based on where you live and a winner is determined from each of them. The fourteen winners are invited to participate at the junior handling national held in one of the fourteen zones.

The winner of the CKC junior handling national will then be invited to participate at the prestigious Crufts show in the United Kingdom. Crufts is the most prestigious junior handling competition where the best of each country will compete for the tittle of Best Junior Handler in the World. I am so excited for this opportunity.





And lastly, to embrace the season: I dressed my dog up as a cat for Halloween. Now he won't come when I call him!


