





re-Home for the Howlidays by Parl Prwost

In late July, we had the privilege of re-homing a 5-year-old Springer Spaniel named Dune. We were open to the idea of caring for another dog, who would become a companion to our almost 3-year-old Wired-hair Vizsla named RADAR.

Needless to say, it's important to find the right fit for both human and dog. Since we were re-homing, we were aware that Dune was used to certain routines that were different from ours. Here are some important things that we had to consider:

• <u>Crates are Happy Places</u>: Crates benefit both humans and dogs. Train your new dog to love his/her crate, and know that it is always a safe place where good things happen. Favourite and familiar toys/mats/bowls/beds are also important when transitioning to a new home.

Dune often runs into his crate for some quiet time. He also loves his slimy/gummy rubber duckie.

Food: Respect your dog's previous feeding times, types and amounts of meals/treats.

Dune was fed raw beef (due to a chicken and grain allergy) so we weaned him off of raw foods, and transitioned him to RADAR's diet of grain-free kibble (topped with fresh fruits and vegetables) which subsequently improved his digestion and elimination. Both dogs now devour the same type of meals voraciously.

- **Potty**: Your dog may have had a different routine as to the time/frequency/location/communication of potty. Sitting/whining/barking/scratching at the door may be a message that it is time to go. We always give Dune and RADAR the opportunity for relief right after a meal.
- **Sleeping/Waking Hours**: Your dog may be used to different waking/sleeping hours. If not crated or managed, s/he may become your new alarm clock.
- **Exercise**: Ensure your dog enjoys similar amounts of exercises/walks/playtime/quiet time as before. As a Springer Spaniel, Dune has enormous energy that even tires out a Wired-hair Vizsla!
- **<u>Travel</u>**: Note if your dog travels well in a vehicle or needs comfort. When outdoors, consider the different types of collars, leashes, harnesses, muzzles available.
- <u>Grooming</u>: Your dog may require grooming.
 Unlike RADAR's fuss-free fur, Dune's hair often mats and requires frequent combing; especially when we found Dune frolicking in a field full of burrs! With his love for water, Dune's ears are often prone to infections and require extra drying and cleaning.
- **<u>Training</u>**: Note the level and amount of training your dog has previously received, and plan for any future training you may want to give.

Dune came to us with an understanding of basic obedient commands (sit, stay, down and has since learned paw, roll, and jump). Yes you can teach old dog new tricks. Dune loved to catch a ball but would never bring it back. Slowly he learned to retrieve. He now catches the ball and brings it back. He even retrieves rubber ducks!

Special needs could be triggered by medical issues, allergies, mobility issues, etc. Dune's digestive issues (caused by allergies) now seem to be remedied by his new grain-free and fowl-free diet. Also understand that some dogs feel that they need a purpose/raison d'etre. Dune came from a home of five human kids. Dune naturally took on the responsibility of watching and guarding the kids when they played outside. Dune has now adjusted to looking after only one juvenile fur kid name RADAR.

Dune is fitting in well with us, with his new human parents and canine brother. We are just waiting to see if he thinks our Christmas tree is his personal indoor outhouse?

Common Holiday Hazards for Dogs



The holidays pose many risks for our dogs. Shiny, tantalizing decorations on display, plentiful foods abound and new plants and flowers to discover. Keep your dog safe this holiday and be aware of the many hazards to ensure you and your dog have a happy holiday season. Be sure to always have your emergency veterinarian's phone number handy and in case of accidental poisoning, you can call the ASPCA Poison Control Hotline at (888) 426-4435) (a fee may apply).

Holiday Foods:

Nuts

- Almonds Ingestion can cause stomach upset and create gastric intestinal distress, as they
 are not easily digested by dogs.
- Macadamia Nuts Ingestion can cause lethargy vomiting, tremors, joint stiffness and difficulty walking. Also, since these nuts are very fatty, ingestion can cause pancreatitis.
- · Pecans Ingestion can cause gastric intestinal upset or even obstruction.
- Pistachios Ingestion of repeated large amounts can cause upset stomach and even pancreattits.
- Walnuts Ingestion can cause major gastrointestinal Issues. They also take a long time for dog's stomachs to break them down, so there is a risk for obstructions.

Chocolate and Cocoa – Ingestion causes gastrointestinal upset, elevated heart rate, agitation and can cause seizures and death. Dark chocolate and baker's chocolate is more toxic than milk chocolate.

Garlic - Ingestion in large amounts can cause anemia and gastrointestinal upset.

Grapes, Raisins & Currants - Even small amounts can cause kidney failure.

Meat Scraps - Ingestion of fatty meat scraps such as ham, gravy, etc. can produce severe

inflammation of the pancreas (pancreatitis) leading to abdominal pain, vomiting and bloody diarrhea.

Onions, Leeks & Chives - Ingestion can cause anemia and gastrointestinal upset.

Salt – Ingestion can cause vomiting, diarrhea, lethargy, excessive thirst or urination, tremors, seizures, coma and death.

Unbaked Bread Dough – Ingestion will cause the dough to expand in the stomach, which could cause the stomach to twist, cutting off blood supply. Also, the yeast in the dough can produce

alcohol, which can cause seizures and respiratory failure.

Xylitol – A sugar-free sweetner, found in many products including gum and peanut butter, that if ingested causes dangerous drops in blood sugar and liver failure.

Holiday Beverages:

- Alcohol Ingestion can cause dangerous drops in blood sugar, blood pressure and body temperatures. Intoxicated animals can experience seizures and respiratory failure.
- Caffeine Dogs tend to be more sensitive to caffeine compared to people. Ingestion can cause hyperactivity, restlessness, vomiting, elevated heart rate, hypertension, abnormal heart rhythms, tremors, hyperthermia, seizures, collapse and even death.
